While we strive to create a campus where all students can thrive and be successful- we continually grow and evolve to incorporate innovative methods to help us better serve our students.



#### LLI Benchmarking Data for 8th grade

In the fall of 2018 we began our third full year of implementation of the Leveled Literacy Intervention Program in the Junior High. Implementation continues to shown significant increases across all participating student cohorts. The following chart shows fall benchmark scores for incoming 7th graders and gives an indication of the number of students reading "below grade level" when they enroll at Effie Kokrine. We will conduct spring benchmark testing at the beginning of May.


#### **Effie Kokrine Charter School**

### 2018/2019 School Goals

- Targeted Instruction- Develop a deeper understanding of targeted instruction techniques and incorporate regularly in lesson planning and classroom instruction.
- Student Reflection- Incorporate a focus on student self-reflection in lesson planning and classroom instruction throughout the year and utilize various methods to assess student growth in this area.
- Classroom Culture- Strengthen the *culture for learning* in the classroom through focusing on students understanding the importance of specific skills and content and students embracing high expectations for learning and achievement.
- Student Engagement- Utilize techniques to increase student engagement in the classroom. Plan
  activities and assignments and utilizing instructional materials and pacing that are aligned with
  instructional outcomes and result in intellectual engagement of students.

As one method of measuring school goal effects on students, Teachers administered an end of semester Instructor Evaluation. Each teacher customized a portion of the survey and then included four "common questions" that were asked in every class.

### Section IV: Charter School Activity Description

#### **First Quarter**

#### Fall Culture Camp -

7th & 8th grade students spent two days at Red Squirrel Campground participating in workshops and team building activities.

#### Howard Luke Birthday Potlatch-

One of the longest standing and most important school traditions, Howard's birthday celebration includes student involvement at every level. Students planned, prepared food, and hosted guests in celebration of our campuses namesake.

#### **Second Quarter**

#### **Athabascan Fiddle Festival**

7-12th graders attended this important annual event and visited and danced with Elders. Additionally, students and staff sold food at the festival as a fundraiser.

#### Portfolio Parent/Teacher Conferences-

Students presented portfolios of work samples and reflections to family members, followed by conferences with teachers and advisors.

#### **Holiday Bazaar**

The Effie Booster Club sponsored the annual Holiday Bazaar. Students volunteered to raise funds for FFA and as well as athletic teams.

#### Honor Roll Assembly and Breakfast-

Effie staff recognized honor roll students in a school-wide assembly and later hosted a breakfast for students and family members.

#### Alaska Native Education (ANE) Literacy Challenge-

Seventh and eighth graders interviewed elders and created short videos that were submitted to the Literacy Challenge.

#### **EFFIE- Effie Families Feed Individuals Everywhere**

Eighth graders learned about homelessness in Fairbanks and then sewed hats and mittens and collected other types of winter clothing as part of a clothing drive. Clothing and hot food were distributed at the Tribal Hall.

#### **Third Quarter**

#### **Native Arts Class-**

Students learned to sew Kuspuks, carve paddles from spruce driftwood and construct ulu's.

#### **Cultural Science Fair-**

The 8th grade held the annual Cultural Science Fair. Volunteer judges from a variety of organizations throughout the community participated. Several projects were selected for entry in the Interior Alaska Science Fair.

#### Gwich'in Shree (Sun) Celebration-

The Gwich'in Language Class hosted elder Bill Stevens and family members for a traditional celebration marking the return of the sun. Students gave speeches in Gwich'in.

#### **Festival of Native Arts-**

All EKCS middle and high school students participated in cultural classes hosted by the Festival of Native Arts.

#### Fairbanks Shakespeare Bard-a-thon-

High school students participated in in the Fairbanks Shakespeare Theater's Bard-a-thon by reading character parts during the annual week-long event.

#### **Fourth Quarter**

#### **Snowshoe Tea Race-**

The Annual Snowshoe Tea Race was held at Effie Kokrine Charter School with the Watershed Charter School students participating.

#### Wilderness Club Denali Park Campout -

Seventh graders traveled to the Denali Park Kennel. Students mushed in to the Savage River Campground and winter camped for one night with assistance from Park Service staff.

#### Creamer's Field, Spring Migration Survey-

High school students conducted migratory songbird banding and bird species identification.

#### Thinking Globally, Acting Locally-

Eighth graders participated in campus cleanup and volunteered at the Food Bank and Pioneer Home to fulfill the service learning requirements of this module.

### Section VI: Changes

#### JH Schedule-

The JH team will continue experimenting with class schedule changes allowing for increased movement between classrooms/teachers in an effort to improve successful transition to high school.

#### **Cell Phone Policy-**

HS Teachers elected to adopt a team-wide cell phone policy for all core academic classes. All classes require students to turn phones in to the teacher at the beginning of class.

#### Behavioral Health Referrals-

EKCS will continue to work with FNA Behavioral Health to streamline our referral process to ensure that students have expanded access to behavioral health services.

#### On Site Family Services Coordinator-

In partnership with the Fairbanks Native Association, a Family Services Coordinator is a full time member of the Effie staff. This position is grant funded to continue for three more years.

#### Early College Class Offerings-

EKCS has signed an MOA with Illiksagvik College and offered Eng 111 taught by an EKCS teacher during fall semester.
