

Career/Technical Learning experiences are provided to prepare students for entrance into the workforce with marketable skills and employability skills as well as creating a foundation for postsecondary training and learning. Courses are offered in automotive, small engines, metals and welding, natural resources, drafting, computer programming, culinary arts, medical terminology, introduction to health careers and a certified nursing assistant course. Students may receive college credit in many of these career/technology courses.

Physical Fitness/Health/Athletics

Students learn healthy-living skills and teamwork in classroom and gymnasium activities. NPHS has a unique outdoor adventure program which instills self-confidence and appreciation for Alaskan recreation. Extra-curricular activities include: baseball, basketball, cheer, cross-country running, flag football, football, hockey, soccer, softball, swimming, track and field, volleyball and wrestling.

Special Education The special education classes serve the needs of students who face academic, physical and/or emotional challenges. The purpose of the program is to provide students with skills to reach their individual goals, while providing services that ensure success in the community. Classes are offered for emotional and behavioral disorders, intensive resources, learning disabled, and speech/ language.

Service Organizations

Ignition is a transition program that helps students build relationships and make a positive shift to high school. On the first day of school, freshmen and new students meet with teachers, mentors, attend group activities, tour buildings and familiarize themselves with class schedules.

Key Club is a service organization that provides learning experiences which encourages students to become involved in school and the community. Key Club participates in a winter coat and clothing swap, Kiwanis Christmas Tree Sales and City-Wide Cleanup Day.

National Honor Society selects students for membership in this national organization based on scholarship, leadership, character and service. The members actively participate in school and extracurricular activities.

Student Council is composed of 16 elected members. The organization acts as a liaison between students and faculty. It advises administration of ways in which our school may be improved. Council members have a voice in the policies affecting students at the building, regional and state levels.

Graduation Requirements

Students must earn a minimum of 22.5 credits in grades 9 through 12. Required credits are: English 4; Health .5; Math (including algebra 1) 3; Physical Education 1.5; Social Studies including Alaska Studies 3.5; Science 3; and 7 Elective credits.

North Pole High School serves the needs of a multi-ethnic, multi-cultural student body through diverse programs and activities.

Air Force Junior ROTC AFJROTC offers classes in aerospace science, leadership, management, communication and survival skills. Seniors are offered flight ground school in preparation for their private pilot's license. The program provides a military atmosphere complete with uniforms, drills and ceremonies. Extra-curricular activities include color guard, drill team and summer camp.

Art The art program introduces students to the world of art while identifying and developing skills in line drawing, water color and acrylic painting, ceramics, sculpture, printmaking, fibers, jewelry design and photography.

Distance Delivery Distance Delivery provides students with the opportunity to take courses through the use of synchronous video-conference classes. This means that students will either be on the sending end of the video-conference where the teacher is physically present in the classroom, or on the receiving end of the video-conference where the teacher delivers real-time instruction, but from a different location within the district. Students in both the receiving and sending portions of the class will be visible to the teacher and other students within the class at all times.

eLearning eLearning courses are online through Apex Learning. Apex delivers a wide range of solutions for original credit, Advanced Placement (AP), and credit recovery. Their rigorous standards-based courses in math, science, English, social studies, world languages, and electives meet high school graduation requirements and provide a complete course of study that offers breadth of standards coverage, depth of instruction, and integrated formative and summative assessments.

Music The music program introduces students to the fundamentals of music and develops their talents. Students receive training in vocal and/or instrumental music. The music department produces musicals and concerts, and participates in regional, state and national competitions.
