3		The district will follow due process procedures for dismissal or non-retention of a
4		tenured teacher established by Alaska Statute 14.20.180.

6		Dismissal is the termination of a tenured or nontenured teacher's contract
7		prior to the stated duration of the contract.

9		The district shall comply with Alaska Statute 14.20.170 that outlines the
10		causes for dismissal of a nontenured or tenured teacher.

12		The district shall comply with Alaska Statute 14.20.180 (a)(c)(d) and (e) that

Spotlight: OneTree

OneTree was a program from the UAF School of Natural Resources and Agricultural Sciences department. Since its inception, OneTree had been engaging K-12 students in science and art. The concept was that one birch tree cut down in July 2009 would be used for instruction, as well as art and craft creations. Subsequently, seventeen more trees were added. Hundreds of students and dozens of teachers in the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District had participated in OneTree. Janice Dawe, adjunct professor, School of Natural Resources and Agricultural Sciences, and Project OneTree coordinator, shared highlights of the program with the board.

During the 2010-11 school year, thirteen schools with twenty-four K-12 classrooms, participated in the project. Moira O'Malley, Watershed Charter School second grade teacher, described how the project was being implemented and talked about the benefit to students. She also had second grade student, Ella Adasiak, speak about the program. Ms. Adasiak said the project was fun and went into detail about keeping a journal, observations, etc.

Chris Greenfield-Pastro, Randy Smith Middle School teacher, talked about the implementation of the project at Randy Smith. He thought it helped students develop keen observation skills.

PUBLIC COMMENT ON NONAGENDA ITEMS

Vicki Stutzke, 420 Peregrine Drive, spoke about how she understood, but was sorry, the graduation success program had been eliminated from the 2011-2012 budget. The program had helped her middle school child be successful. Without the program, he might not had made it. Ms. Stutzke found it difficult to get together with teachers after school, but the graduation success coach was able to help her son with academic problems, homework, and tutoring. It also gave her son another adult, other than her, to be accountable to. She knew that 90 percent of the students did not need the program, but the other 10 percent did. Ms. Stutzke hoped the board would be able to help the other 10 percent.

PUBLIC COMMENT ON NONAGENDA ITEMS (continued)

Deb Hickok, PO Box 70809, thanked the board for the opportunity to have Chinese taught at West Valley High School for the past two years. However, Ms. Hickok was disappointed advanced Chinese classes would not be taught at West Valley next year, although students could take a class at UAF. UAF's class schedule conflicted with her daughter's after school schedule so she would be enrolling her daughter in a summer immersion program in Minnesota. It would be expensive, but she felt it was necessary for her daughter to continue learning the language and culture since she was Chinese. Ms. Hickok had adopted her daughter from China when she was four months old. She noted the district would grant her daughter one credit if she completed the immersion program over the summer.

NEW BUSINESS

Policy 162: Lowering Flags in Commemoration (First Reading)

In response to public testimony, the administration reviewed Policy 162 Lowering Flags in Commemoration and presented revisions to the school board.

MCCONNELL MOVED, HULL SECONDED, TO APPROVE FIRST READING, PUBLIC HEARING, AND ADVANCEMENT TO SECOND READING OF POLICY 162: LOWERING FLAGS IN COMMEMORATION.

Superintendent Lewis reported he had met with the community member who had originally raised concerns about the district's handling of the United States Flag after he had testified to the board at an earlier board meeting. The administration had distributed information to the buildings on the correct handling and display of the flag. The proposed policy was updating the policy to reflect the district's practice.

Bett Schaffhauser, employment and educational opportunity director, explained the previous version of the policy, adopted in 1980, provided guidelines to flying the United States Flag at half-staff in honor of various persons, by direction of the President, Governor of Alaska, City Mayor, and Borough Mayor. It called for the lowering of the flag upon the passing of the superintendent or a member of the school board. It directed a school to lower its United States Flag to half-staff at the passing of a staff member or student. It also gave the principal the discretion to lower the school's flag to half-staff upon the passing of someone closely associated with the school.

Ms. Schaffhauser reported building principals had been polled in regards to the policy. The principals indicated they had lowered the flag in response to direction from the administration. No principal had direct experience of lowering the flag for the passing of a school board member, superintendent, staff member, or student. No principal reported having a building flag that would be lowered to honor the passing of someone closely associated with the school. It was clear the policy did not reflect current practice.

After public testimony to the board in December, Superintendent Lewis ordered a review of the policy. Research on the policy led to the legal authorities and codes included in the proposed policy. The codes provided for the United States Flag to be flown at half-staff as directed by the President of the United States or by proclamation of the state governor. The code also allowed for the flag to fly at half-staff in accordance with recognized customs and practices not inconsistent with law. The language allowing the flag to be lower to half-staff in accordance with recognized customs and practices, not inconsistent with law, dated back to an executive order issued by President Dwight Eisenhower in 1954.

Policy 162: Lowering Flags in Commemoration (First Reading) (continued)

In that same executive order, President Eisenhower gave authority to heads of departments and agencies of the government to direct the lowering of the flag. The executive order was incorporated into law in 4 U.S.C. Chapter 1, Section 7(m). After combining the information found during research, along with the actual practice in the schools, the administration had forwarded the proposed policy to the board for consideration.

INFORMATION AND REPORTS

Language Arts Materials Report

The district's curriculum revision process included the selection of textbooks and materials to support the implementation of adopted curricula. Peggy Carlson, executive director of curriculum and instruction, provided a report that included the elementary language arts materials being considered for adoption. The materials would remain available for review and the administration anticipated making a final recommendation at the April 19, 2011 board meeting.

The Fairbanks North Star Borough School District curriculum revision process included the selection of textbooks and materials for recommendation to the school board for adoption. The current elementary series was Harcourt's *Trophies*, 2005. Multiple literature anthologies and composition texts were adopted at the middle and secondary level to address the variety of courses offered.

The textbook selection process involved the collection of materials, screening by teachers, review by the Board Curriculum Advisory Committee (BCAC), public review, information from the publishers, and a review of available research.

Although textbook adoption and purchase did not occur until after the curriculum was adopted, the selection process began earlier. Publishers and language arts materials vendors were invited to provide samples of their texts and materials to the district for review.

During January and February, teachers reviewed K-6 core programs. They recorded ratings and comments for each set of materials based on curriculum content, content strength and emphasis, support materials, presentation of materials, and equity issues. The curriculum department, with the assistance of the research and accountability department, had compiled the information.

The curriculum department also invited the public to review the materials. The curriculum library regular hours of operation, as well as extended evening hours, had been publicized. The Board Curriculum Advisory Committee also had the opportunity to review materials.

Language Arts Materials Report (continued)

Last spring, during budget discussions, the decision was made to review and replace only elementary language arts textbooks. The decision was made after a survey was sent to secondary administrators which asked the following questions:

- 1. Approximately what percentage of core textbooks were currently in poor condition and not able to last another six years?
- 2. Approximately what percentage of tradebooks (classroom sets used for instruction) were currently in poor condition and not able to last another six years?
- 3. How many of teachers had the teacher resource materials for the core textbooks adopted in 2005?

Responses indicated the majority of core textbooks and teacher resource materials would last another six years. Funds were allocated for secondary textbook replacements and additional tradebooks.

The K-6 core programs for language arts were listed below. They would continue to be available for review in the curriculum library.

Summer Construction Briefing

Dave Ferree, assistant superintendent for facilities management, provided a summary of planned summer construction activities.

OCTOBER 2009 BOND PROJECTS

Weller Elementary Lighting Project - This was a design-build contract awarded to Tunista Construction, LLC by the borough, in the amount of \$1.6 million. Work would consist of removal and replacement of virtually all interior and exterior lighting throughout the facility. Lighting would be significantly improved and, at the same time, would operate at significantly lower power requirements, reducing ongoing utility bills. The project would also include new ceilings throughout the facility with improved earthquake survivability.

Summer Construction Briefing (continued)

North Pole High Lighting Project - This was a design-build contract awarded to Johnson River Enterprises, LLC by the borough, in the amount of \$3 million. Work would consist of removal and replacement of virtually all interior and exterior lighting throughout the facility. Lighting would be significantly improved and, at the same time, would operate at significantly lower power requirements, reducing ongoing utility bills. Ceilings would also receive improved structural support to improve earthquake survivability. The project would require two summers to complete.

Salcha Elementary Site and Playground Upgrades – Work would consist of replacement and upgrade of all playground equipment and fall surfaces, sidewalk replacement, lighting improvements, and general site upgrades. This would also bring the playground and front entry of the school into ADA compliance. The budget for this project would be \$550,000 and was currently out to bid.

Badger Road Elementary Building Exterior Upgrades – Work would consist of replacement of windows, doors, siding and/or exterior painting. Wherever possible, exterior insulation would be improved, resulting in some savings in long-term utility costs. The budget for this project would be \$1.25 million and was currently out to bid.

School District Facilities Maintenance Fund

Ryan Middle School Interior Structural Work – The purpose of the project would be to perform temporary internal structural improvements to the classroom wing of the facility to improve the seismic performance of the building. Work would consist of exposing a number of interior walls, stiffening them with floor to ceiling plywood sheathing, and then repairing the walls. The budget for this project would be \$500,000 and was currently out to bid.

GRANT-FUNDED WORK

Districtwide Underground Fuel Storage Tank Replacement - This would be the third year of the project and would complete this phase of the work. The last phase would include converting heating systems in some schools to dual fuel (heating oil or natural gas) capability. The cost for the entire project would total approximately \$3.6 million. The project included replacement of 16 underground fuel storage tanks located throughout the school district. All new storage tanks would be double walled with integrated leak detection systems and were mandated by federal EPA. The upcoming summer's work included tanks at Salcha, Badger, Weller, and North Pole Middle.

Ticasuk Brown Elementary Septic System Replacement – This work was made possible by a grant obtained by the state interior legislative delegation during the 2010 legislative session and the district sincerely thank them for their successful effort. The project would replace the entire school septic system including the tankage system and leach field. The budget for this project would be \$450,000 and was currently in design.

IN HOUSE PROJECTS

Joy & Pearl Creek Elementary Hallway Flooring Replacement - The project included replacing the carpet in the school corridors with new rubber tile flooring to the extent the budget would allow.

Pearl Creek Elementary First Floor Window Replacement – The project would replace all first floor classroom windows and would result in improved energy conservation.

Summer Construction Briefing (continued)

Pearl Creek & North Pole Elementary Gym Light Fixture Replacement – The project would replace all gymnasium light fixtures, replacing high pressure sodium and metal halide fixtures with modern T-5 fluorescent fixtures. The lighting would be significantly improved and operating costs for lighting would be greatly reduced. The project has an estimated three year payback of the costs with savings in electrical utility payments.

WARRANTY REPAIRS

Badger Road Elementary Hallway Carpet Replacement – The hallway carpets were replaced during a capital improvement project in 2006. Problems with the carpet seams had resulted in the manufacturer agreeing to completely replace the carpet with new. The manufacturer had documented correction of the defects to the district's satisfaction prior to the agreement to accept the replacement solution.

APPROXIMATE TOTAL EXPENDITURE FOR THE PROJECTS: \$8 MILLION

Although the total cost of the projects was approximately \$8 million, Mr. Ferree pointed out the bulk of the cost, \$6.1 million or about 77 percent was funded through state matching funds or state grants. He felt the school board, along with borough officials and the interior delegation should be congratulated for the hard work they had done to bring the funds to the local community which would benefit every public school in the Fairbanks North Star Borough.

As discussions would begin on the school construction bond, it was important to realize local school improvements were largely funded not by property taxes but by state funds as a result of a lot of hard work by the board and the interior delegation, including Senators Thomas, Paskvan, and Coghill; and Representatives Miller, Guttenberg, Kawasaki, Thompson, and Wilson.
