Mission

Effie Kokrine Charter School (EKECCS) is a school of choice and first opened its doors in August of 2005. It is located on the Howard Luke Campus at 601 Loftus Road here in Fairbanks. May 24, 2011, the Fairbanks North Star Borough School District approved the school name change to Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School (EKECCS) because of the early college program initiated here and its mission of preparing students for higher education and graduating from high school with a life plan in place.

The mission of EKECCS is to provide educational opportunities for student to succeed in the world by developing a strong sense of purpose, identity, place, and community through cultural and academic empowerment. The philosophy of EKECCS is that, for students to achieve the educational goals, learning must connect or resonate with them. EKECCS strives to relate curriculum, teaching methods and the whole school experience to the homes and social communities of our students.

This free public school is designed for all students in grades 7-12 who are looking for a small school focusing on rigorous academics, individual learning styles, and lessons integrating both traditional and contemporary knowledge. EKECCS is not an alternative school. It is not a school just for Alaska Natives students. Any student who attends EKECCS has to make a "C" or higher in order to receive a passing grade in any class on their school transcript. Any grade below 70% is an "F". This is a significant difference from other schools in the district. Expectations are high. If students can't meet the expectations, they are transferred back to their home schools in the district. This year, we have had the lowest number of students transferring back to their home schools.

Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School serves students in junior high (grades 7 and 8) and high school (9-12). In 2005, the student body makeup was 97% Alaska Native. Over the years, the student population has become more diverse. Today, 18% are Caucasian, 7% African-American, 6% Hispanic, 57% Alaska Native/American Indian, 12% Multi-Ethnic. We celebrate all people and their respective cultures by providing a caring learning environment for all students, parents and staff.

EKECCS provides students the opportunity to learn about, and learn within, all cultures. Not only are the Alaska Native cultures taught, but our students also teach us about their own culture. Classes include both traditional and contemporary knowledge. A science lesson on local plants includes traditional medicinal uses of the plants and scientific lab experiments to visualize the components of the plants and their traditional medicinal uses. The elders teach the Native ways of knowing traditional knowledge and the science teacher engages students in the modern day western knowledge spectrum. Students learn to respect and value both learning systems because it is relevant to their current environment and life-styles.

The learning styles method is used at different levels throughout the school. Students are assessed as to how they learn best: do they respond to visual, auditory or tactile lessons, do they like to work independently in a quiet setting or do they like to listen to music

while working in a group? Students are encouraged to recognize and use their most effective learning style whenever possible, and to adapt to other less favorite methods when necessary.

EKCS has one principal, ten certified teachers – four who teach junior high; five who teach high school classes; one full-time special education teacher, one special education classroom aide, two office staff, and one day custodian. The early college coordinator is fully funded by the Interior-Aleutians Campus, University of Alaska. We have two full-time tutors are funded by the Johnson O'Malley program with the Fairbanks Native Association, offering tutoring services for our students.

Breakfast and lunch is served at the school. An average of 69% of our students receive free and reduced lunch. Transportation is available provided by the school district on all days that the rest of the district schools are in session. First Student picks up students at North Pole (Westcott Pool and McPeak's Store) and Fairbanks middle schools (Tanana, Ryan, and Randy Smith) to bring out to EKECCS before the start of school at 9:50 am for high school and 10:00 am for junior high. Our school day ends at 3:38 on regular days. If we have early out days, students are sent home at 2:10 pm.

This report is written to explain the programs and activities that happen at Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School throughout the year. We have four school programs: junior high, high school, an early college program for high school students, and a summer school program Other developing programs are Future Farmers of American (FFA), the Farm at EKECCS, and Farm to School. The sports program includes volleyball, varsity basketball and cross country running.

The 2014-2015 school calendar, list of EKCS Board, and staff are attached along with board minutes for the year.

Junior High School (Seventh and Eighth Graders)

Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School Junior High students are taught in self-contained classrooms with one highly qualified teacher, using learning styles and a hands-on approach to education. The teachers use the local community as a classroom without walls. Below are some of the learning experiences the students have participated in throughout this year.

Farmer's Market 8/28/13

Middle school students walked or biked to the Farmer's Market and completed a math activity and interviewed farmers.

Fall Culture Camp Granite Tors Trail Campground 8/29-30/14

Middle school students and chaperones spent two days camping out and gathering plant samples, berries, fishing, cooking, listening to Elder stories, playing Native games, and taking nature hikes.

Rachel's Challenge Presentation 9/12/13

Eighth grade students went to this nationally acclaimed anti-bullying presentation at the Hering Auditorium.

Trash as Art Recyclable Project – all year

Through a grant from the National Park Service, the middle school students participated in an art project. They are in the process of completing a full size sculpture of a ses (black bear) made out of recycled materials (mostly Rockstar energy drink cans). The sculpture recently won the People's Choice Award at the UAF Juried Student Art Exhibition in April 2014. The sculpture will be displayed in the vicinity of Peirce Park. The students are working with local artists Craig and Mercedes. The Effie Rockstar Bear will be displayed at the Morris Thompson Cultural Center from May 2-19th and there will be an unveiling of the sculpture at the school on May 20th @ 10:30 am.

Storytelling project with Zac and Klara – 9/23-10/17/13

The eighth grade students worked with an artist to represent storytelling in the altered book form. Students took books and reworked them to express their individual ideas by painting books and cutting out a hole in the middle in which to place an artifact. **Howard Luke's Birthday Party 10/11/13**

All the students at EKECCS participated in the setting up, cooking, serving and cleaning up for the annual birthday celebration for our Elder Howard Luke. This year a record number of guests came to our school to help Howard celebrate his 90th birthday.

AFN participation/made desserts/served at the potlatch 10/23-25/14

All of the students at EKECCS volunteered to make desserts for the AFN potlatch. They made hundreds of desserts and also served at the potlatch.

Fiddler's Festival/made soup 11/7/13

The eighth grade students made moose soup for the Fiddler's. They also attended and danced with Elders. Each student had a dance card and to earn points for this assignment they danced with at least ten Elders. This activity is an excellent example of how our students are following the cultural value of Respect for Elders.

7th Grade Regalia parade 12/19/13

The seventh grade students made regalia from their ethnic heritage and participated in a regalia parade. They wrote an introduction card about themselves and their regalia and then presented their creations to an audience of family, friends and students.

8th Grade Christmas play 12/19/13

The eighth grade students wrote, produced and acted in the annual 8th grade Christmas play. The play is required to have elements of Christmas and incorporate the cultural values we discuss in our classroom.

Morris Thompson Center/Denakkanaaga/Library visit 2/6/14

The eighth grade students made their annual visit to the Morris Thompson Center and the Noel Wien Library. The tour through the MTC museum is always a wonderful way to connect students with their culture. They always take delight when they recognize the name of a relative that has donated an item to the museum. The main purpose of the library trip is to make sure that each student learns how to use the library for research and to have an undated library card.

Spring Culture Camp at Gaalee'Yaa Camp 2/20-2/21/14

This is the highlight of the eighth grade year, a night or two camping out at Howard Luke's home on the Tanana River. The students have two full days of science oriented activities and use this time to get ideas for their Cultural Science Fair entries. They also have the opportunity to spend time with Elders, do chores for Howard and to spend time outdoors.

Cultural Science Fair 2/27/14

All middle school students are required to enter a project into the science fair. Each entry must have a cultural component and every year our school sends students to the Interior Science Fair.

Ice Park Excursion 3/5/14

The middle school students walk to the Ice Park every year to check out the amazing ice carving entries. This is a great time to get outside together and have a little fun

Hokkaido University visitors/practice tea race 3/6/14

This is the third year that we have hosted Hokkaido University education students at our school. They bring with them wonderful classroom activities and Japanese traditional dance presentations. This year we invited the education students to help us practice for our Annual Tea Race. The Japanese students formed a team and participated in a snowshoe and tea-making race. For the first time on snowshoes, making a fire and brewing tea outside, they did a fabulous job. They did have the benefit of a professor who happened to have published a book on Japanese traditional methods of fire starting.

Annual Tea Race 3/14/14

This has become an Effie tradition to mark the beginning of spring. This year was the second time that Effie hosted the other middle school charter schools, Chinook and Watershed. The middle school trophy went to Watershed last year and they took it home again this year. What a wonderful time was had spending time with our charter school peers. It was a great opportunity to share our cultural tradition and to make new connections.

Arctic Winter Games Potlatch 3/19/14

Effie students and staff spent days preparing food for the AWG potlatch that was held at our school. Students volunteered to serve food at the potlatch. It was a wonderful opportunity to host a multicultural event at our school.

Middle School Math Path to Success – Fridays 3rd quarter

In an effort to improve the math skills of our students the teachers presented review lessons for students on Fridays. Each teacher chose an area of math, such as computation, numeration, measurement, etc. and prepared an experiential math lesson. Students were given the choice of classrooms to visit during Friday math times. They looked forward to Friday math and really enjoyed the opportunity to move throughout the middle classrooms for fun math games.

Denakkanaaga Elder Lunch 4/25/13

It has been a goal of Effie and Denakkanaaga to alternate lunch dates with Elders and students. Elders came to lunch during the Cultural Science Fair and students attended lunch at Denaakkanaaga in the Morris Thompson Cultural Center.

4-H Mushing Club April 2014

The seventh grade classes participated in 4-H Mushing Club and had the opportunity to mush with an Iditarod musher. They learned the finer points of dog racing in addition to learning how to train and care for the dogs. The students volunteered at the Jr. North American dog races March 9, 2014. This is the second year of the dog mushing program. Eighth graders who went through the program the previous year, were eligible to apply to be assistant helper to the dog mushers and assist with the new students - a great opportunity for the students to practice what they learned. There is a high interest in this program in the Junior High.

Hunter's Education April 2014

The seventh grade classes participated in Hunter's Education during the month of April. Each student who passed the class will receive a Basic Hunter Education certificate.

Junior High Integrated Modules and Final Projects

Throughout the year, instruction is organized around six-week themes that integrate across the curriculum.

- ➤ Subsistence/Health/Wellness Subsistence Animal Project, Medicinal Plants, Native Foods Pyramid (Cultural Values taught: sharing, providing for family, compassion, love, and dignity)

- ➤ Language/Cultural Expression Regalia Parade, Family history mobiles, Christmas play (Cultural Values: Knowledge of language, wisdom, and spirituality)
- > Energy/Ecology/Technology Cultural Science Fair (Cultural Values: Respect for nature, hard work, and self-sufficiency)
- ➤ Living in Place/Survival Hunter's Education Course, 4-H Mushing Program, Living in Place research project/paper (Cultural Values: Honoring our ancestors, honesty, humility, and humor)
- ➤ Think Globally/Act Locally South America and Africa Projects, Service learning/volunteer activities, U.S. History CAP (Cultural Values: Respect for others and peace)

2013/2014 High School Highlights

The high school at EKECCS was marked this year by an increased focus on academic achievement in the classroom, a broadening of partnerships with parents and the ongoing support of rich opportunities for student learning beyond the classroom walls in the greater Fairbanks community.

At EKECCS, we believe that school traditions reflect our vision of learning as something that should be valued and celebrated publicly. This year we began hosting quarterly honor roll assemblies followed by an honor roll breakfast for families. Two of our students were accepted into the highly competitive Rural Alaska Honors Institute

Research Academy. We saw an increase in students eligible for the Alaska Performance Scholarship. Elective offerings expanded with the addition of Photoshop and Field Ecology classes. The high school continued to prioritize the offering of three different AK Native Language classes (Inupiaq, Gwich'in, and Koyukon) through a partnership with the Alaska Native Language Center and community elders.

One of our greatest strengths is the close relationship that we are able to develop with families. Using an Advisory structure, we communicated on a weekly basis with parents through required grade checks and informal contact. This resulted in our highest rates of attendance to date at Parent/Teacher/Portfolio conferences. The high school team continues to expand and modify our interventions for students experiencing low academic achievement. After school study hall was held four days a week and Saturday school took place consistently throughout the second semester.

High School students were directly involved in hosting and participating in a series of important community events. Howard Luke celebrated his 90th birthday with a potlatch event planned and hosted entirely by Effie students. The return of the Alaska Federation of Natives Annual Convention to Fairbanks created the opportunity for students to serve the thousands of guests at the Welcoming Potlatch at the Big Dipper. Over spring break, students welcomed Arctic Winter Games athletes to the school for a celebration of Native foods and cultures. During 4th Quarter, advisory classes focused on projects that brought student learning out into the Fairbanks community. Eleventh graders set up Job Shadows after completing Career Interest Inventories using the Alaska Career Information System. Ninth and tenth graders planned and recorded interviews with community members as part of our annual Oral History Project.

The overall success of the 2013/2014 school year was exemplified by the lowest transience rate in the high school (student withdrawals) in the past five years and steady demand to join our school community (our waiting list grew throughout the year averaging more than ten students throughout spring semester).

Early College Motto: Encourage. Engage. Empower. Early College.

In January 2007, Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School (EKECCS) partnered with Alaska Native Association, Antioch's Center for Native Education and Interior Aleutians campus and worked together under the Bill and Melinda Gate's Foundation grant to bring dual credit college courses to first generation college students and underserved students who may not have considered college in their future. Since that first year of offering random college courses, the Early College Program at EKECCS now has a set program of courses that is offered each year. This course program begins with English starting in the summer after the grade 10 and spirals up through the fall of their senior year ending with English 213, Writing for the Social and Natural Sciences. Math begins in the fall with Math 106 and concludes with Calculus 200.

The Early College Program offers up to 61 college credits for its students. The courses beyond math and English include: DEVS 110, College and Career Readiness, Inupiaq, Communications in the Public Context (Comm. 141x) Chemistry and Society, Chemistry 100, and Chemistry 103, Introduction to Wildland fire (Fire 151 x, and 152), beginning in Fall 2014 Ethnobotany, and in Summer 2015 Biology 104(Natural History of Alaska). The program offers the core classes needed for students in their first year of college. The college classes average 9 students per class. The smallest class is Inupiaq and our largest classes are Communications and College and Career Readiness, both averaging 16 students per class. In the graphs that follow (table 1 and 2) the number of students not completing courses was high and now we are starting to move towards 100 % completion. The number of students does fluctuate each year due to instructor availability. However, over the past year and a half, the instructor and department commitment are steady.

Preparing for college:

Each year Early College hosts a parent information night for both for middle and high school families. Our parents are encouraged to work closely with the Early College Coordinator to develop a plan and timeline for their child on the journey through high school and on to college or a career and technical program. The Early College Office provides Alaska Performance Scholarships, college information, and post-secondary options to all students. The common goal for both Early College, middle and high school advisors is stressing to students and their families the importance of staying on track. The program is growing each year and EKECCS has a strong partnership with Interior Aleutians Campus and College of Rural Community Development, CRCD, the Communications Department at UAF, Alaska Satellite Facility and NASA, who sponsored our college chemistry courses and now supports the EKECCS Robotics program. Starting in fall 2014, Dr. Duffy, from the UAF Chemistry Department will begin teaching chemistry for the Early College Program.

Early College: Career Development Outreach:

New this spring is the numerous internship opportunities for the EKECCS students through our newest and most active partner, National Park Service (Gates of the Arctic National Park and Preserve and Yukon-Charley Rivers National Preserve. The professionals at NPS are excited to work with our students and teachers throughout the year. Last summer we had one student attend the Small Mammals Monitoring study in Denali National Park for a week of data collection with Biologist Melanie Flamme and a group of other students from the greater Fairbanks area.

During summer 2014, two students will be working for NPS at the Museum of the North under the direction of Link Olsen. The other projects Effie Students are engaged in with National Park Service include the Yellow Billed Loon Videography Project and the Sheep Skeleton Project, both happening later in July.

This year, the Early College Coordinator was asked to give a talk at the National Park Service, Brown Bag series to introduce our program and welcome them as our neighbor. In return Earl College arranged and hosted two Brown Bag sessions for students to attend

a 20-minute meet and greet with NPS and the UAF Ethnobotanist. These sessions were well attended for the first attempt.

On Friday May 2, students will attend the NPS Career open house to talk to scientists about careers at National Park Service.

School wide Community Service: Peirce Park Project and Transforming Dead man Slough:

Vision: The Peirce Park Living Lab Project: where community stewardship and science education meet.


The Peirce Park Project stemmed from a concerned citizen who attended a staff meeting in the fall of 2012. In spring 2013, EKECCS attended a meeting with the Tanana Valley Watershed Association that opened the door for our school to develop the partners to begin this community wide effort. Today the Peirce Park Project is moving forward and EKECCS students are working with Landscape Architects from Bettisworth North on landscape design process and preparing for the community meeting in mid-May. Educational opportunities are planned for EKECCS students to participate in dual credit college courses throughout the development process to assist with baseline botanical and Natural Resource data, surveying workshop for our math students, an Introduction to Engineering for bridge building and One Tree to facilitate total use of all trees in the park, these are a few of the planned programs to engage students in park. The end goal is a safe place for our classes, local schools, families and greater community to enjoy this small park and participate in citizen science.

Slough Awareness though art and Transforming Deadman Slough were projects our middle school students worked on this past fall with four local artists on two major projects: the Trash to Art project and the Slough Awareness project. The Trash to Art is a community art project that our middle school created with the help of local artists Craig Cheledinas, Mercedes Culliton and Loretta Brown from the Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies. The students worked with Loretta to learn about how trash and recyclables can be transformed as well as the importance of recycling and refuse. Students had collected recyclables and neighboring Mocha Dan's coffee stand saved milk jugs and cans for the project. Students voted to create a black bear that will be placed in Peirce Park as a reminder to care for public places and wildlife habitat. This bear is made from repurposed aluminum Rock Star cans and was part of this year's Sustainable Art Show at UAF and will be on display May 2nd at the Morris Thompson Cultural and Visitors Center. The Second project was completed in late November with Klara Meish and Zac Myers from One Tree. Students collected traditional plants from Peirce Park and the riparian zone to create altered books and use mixed media for expression of science through art, give a voice to place and found new ways to tell a story. These projects would not have been possible without the microgrant support from Alaska Geographic and the National Park Service's Murie Science Center.

The Peirce Park Project has brought local agencies to our table that supports our efforts in teaching natural resource conservation, career development and enhancing professional

relationships through summer and year-round interaction with agency scientists. Our supporters are: National park Service and their Rivers and Trails Conservation Assistance Program, Bureau of Land Management, U.S Fish and Wildlife Service, Fairbanks North Star Borough Parks and Recreation Department, Tanana Valley Watershed Association, One Tree Alaska, University of Alaska Fairbanks, Murie Science and Learning Center, Alaska Geographic, Fairbanks Public Lands Information Center, Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School, Mocha Dan's, Bettisworth North Architecture and Planning and Center for Alaskan Coastal Studies.

Effie Kokrine FFA

Active enrollment in Effie Kokrine Future Farmers of American (FFA) nearly doubled from last year, with a total of seventeen dues-paying members.

Effie Kokrine FFA hosted a series of fundraisers. "The Great Alaskan Cooking Show" was a Pampered Chef party where students learned how to cook Alaskan foods with Pampered Chef products. Students catered the Athabascan Fiddle Festival at the David Salmon Tribal Hall. A spaghetti feed in February was attended by Representative Scott Kawasaki. Overall, the students raised enough money to buy each FFA member an official dress jacket and send 13 students to FFA State Convention in April.

During National FFA Week, students focused on the part of the FFA motto that says "Living to Serve". Students worked at the Fairbanks Community Food Bank bagging over 300 pounds of rice, flour, and sugar. We hosted a movie night at the Fairbanks Rescue Mission, for which we popped 150 bags of popcorn. On Friday, students served breakfast at Stone Soup Café. During the week, students sewed and knitted infant hats to donate to Fairbanks Memorial Hospital.

The theme of this year's FFA State Convention was "Ignite". It was hosted at Pike's Hotel here in Fairbanks. Effie Kokrine FFA won first place individual in Prepared Public Speaking, Extemporaneous Speaking, Farm Business Management, Creed Speaking, and Veterinary Science. The team from Effie Kokrine FFA came in second place overall in Veterinary Science. In between competitions in Career Development Events (CDEs), students attended leadership workshops lead by guests, including Brian Walsh, the FFA National President. Ronin Ruerup was elected Vice President of the State Association and Sam Unruh was elected Reporter of the State Association.

Next year, we hope to secure Perkins funding to hire a full-time agriculture instructor to lead the FFA as well as manage The Farm at EKECCS. The agriculture instructor can teach a junior high Agricultural Science class as well as high school classes such as Food Science, Fiber Arts, and Experimental Horticulture.

The Farm at EKECCS

The Farm at EKECCS moved to a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) model. CSA members pay an amount of money up front in order to receive a box of vegetables every week for the summer. We began the process of building a new fence and invested in a drip irrigation system that will make watering easier. The adoption of four angora rabbits from Kodiak FFA has been a learning experience—the fiber harvested will be sent to a mill and sold as a fundraiser for FFA. Additionally in 2014, The Farm purchased four chickens to keep as laying hens.

The Farm at EKECCS has potential to become a major fundraiser for the school with the current demand for naturally and locally grown produce as high as it is. By investing in infrastructure to house laying hens (the current price for chicken eggs is \$4.00 a dozen;

duck eggs can fetch as much as \$5.00 a dozen) as well as diversifying to house milk goats (with Certified Food Protection Manager in house, milk can be pasteurized and sold), the Farm can become a one-stop shop for locally grown food.

Farm to School

This year, The Farm at EKECCS is going to preserve the harvest to be served from our school cafeteria. We will begin by integrating Effie grown vegetables into existing menus but hope to develop new menu items that center on food that is in season in Alaska. By investing in training an employee to become a Certified Food Protection Manager, The Farm at EKECCS can produce DEC-certified vegetables. These vegetables can be sold in their processed forms to local restaurants as well as being served through FNSBSD Nutrition Services.


Summer School

For the past three years, Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School has been hosting a summer school program, two four-week sessions, one in June and the other, in July. Utilizing the garden, integrating reading, math, and science, middle school students learn about gardening and agriculture, spending most of the time outdoors, planting, cultivating and harvesting vegetables and preparing them for market. High school students can earn a .5 credit in natural science and .5 credit in an English elective. This year, we will have two classes, one science elective and math for high school students.


This year, new to the summer school program, Tanana Chiefs Conference (TCC) has a National Science Foundation grant, and has partnered Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School to offer to next-year's Juniors and Seniors an archaeological dig run by Bob Sattler and Tom Gillespie, the full-time archaeologists at TCC. It's up on the Yukon River near Eagle at Calico Bluff. We can take up to eight-ten students and they can earn a .5 credit of English and .5 credit of Social Studies. Dates for the camp are June 6 – June 25, 2014. Activities include outside work, building atlatls, learning to flint-knapp, and doing a full-on, trowels & brushes, including computers archaeological dig. Students will read, write and produce stories for a local radio station. A great summer activity and work experience!































This scatter graph shows both Effie and district reading scores for 7th-12th grade during the years 2005 through 2013.




Writing SBA scores over the past eight years in the subgroups of Alaska Native, female and male students, low income and all students.




This scatter graph shows district and Effie writing scores over the same time periods. While the Effie student scores go up and down, there is still a gradual increase in proficient rate over the years.




This graph shows the math SBA scores over the years in the sub-groups of Alaska Native, female and male, low income, and all students.

In 2012-13, Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School received accreditation status through 2016 by meeting the requirements established by the AdvanceED Accreditation Commission and Board of Trustees, Northwest Accreditation Commission.

As a part of this process, a school improvement plan was developed and adopted by the staff, using the Alaska STEPP program. Listed are the goals for Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School that we are working on for academic improvement.

- 1. Improve our communications with our families
- 2. Improve academic plans for individual incoming middle school and freshman students.
- Return to summer program that provide academic and non-academic experiences.
- 4. Provide pertinent Professional Development for teachers.
- 5. Increase our service learning component

As you can see, by the programs and activities Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School is participating in, the staff are diligently working toward improving the academic success of our students and have implemented strategies to meet our goals. By fall of 2014, the statewide testing results will be in and the staff will see where we stand and make plans to continue to improve the educational programs of the school.

Overall, this was another great year for Effie Kokrine Early College Charter School. We have made some very good improvements and will continue to implement our vision, mission and goals. The APC and staff are working through the charter revision process and will have a revised charter before the board by November 2014.

Changes

The APC voted to change the principal administrator to a head-teacher model at their April 2014 meeting. The next administrator will be paid as a head-teacher and be in the Fairbanks Education Association, at their regular teacher salary level, with a stipend of \$600 for each certified person supervised.

She is meeting with Steve Sparrow, Pete Penny to advocate for the EC program to be under the umbrella of UAF with financial support included. There is a great need to raise funds through a raffle or bingo as the cost of tuition is rising. Next semester classes include Wildland Fire (student can get their red card to firefight); English 111, Math 107, Communications 141 and Library Science. The summer program will be offering an English class along with a science credit. There is the fact that the Early College Coordinator position will end June

30, 2015. There are some grants available that could fund Early College. The EKCS Board needs to get involved in planning for the future of the Early College program.

- V. District Presentation on Charter Revision Superintendent Pete Lewis, Kathy Hughes and Mike Fisher discussed charter revision process and timelines with the board. The first written draft will have to be presented to the district after spring break, March 2014. The charter revision will go to the district school board for the meeting packet in October 2014 and presented at the November 2014 board meeting, either the first or third week of the month. The charter revision packet will need to be sent to the Alaska State Board of Education in March 2015 and presented at the June 2015 State Board meeting, which will be held here in Faribanks.
 - a. Grading Policy and FNA Concerns. Pete Lewis discussed concerns from FNA discussions about the grading policy. Grades are currently A, B, C, and F. No D's. There is a concern that students with Ds would

- be passing classes. Ray Dewilde, also an FNA Board member, said the Administration and FNA Board would like a report back on D's. How many students are extending their graduation out because of this policy. Following the break, Linda Woods proposed that comments should be presented to the staff rather than the board. Linda Evans agreed that the next staff meeting would be a time to discuss this topic.
- b. Future leadership. Pete Lewis also discussed considerations of a future principal versus head teacher. The board would need to determine the choice because the hiring processes for each type of position are different. Budget should also be a consideration. Kathy Hughes is knowledgeable of different models of leadership at other charters.
- c. Charter Revision Mike Fisher and Kathy Hughes addressed charter revision and timeline considerations. The application process is geared around what charter has done in prior 10 years of operation and address changes from the initial charter, such as the calendar and the inclusion of early college and early college success. The first meeting for the charter and school district needs to happen right after spring break. In order for the final draft to go to the district board on November 2014, the information needs to get to the district during the last week of October to be in the packet for the November meeting. There was also discussion on the possibility of Title 1 funding, which would require following those funding guidelines. Charter considerations should include how that funding and the mission of the school would support or not support each other.
